REMEMBERING OUR FRIEND

In Memory of Jason Vincent (1974-2020)

The Norwich Historical Society was shocked and devastated to hear of the passing of Jason Vincent. Jason served on our board for many years and he had such a passion for telling the City of Norwich's stories. He was instrumental in building a robust Walktober program in Norwich and laid the groundwork for many projects, such as the Norwich Heritage & Regional Visitors Center and the Walk Norwich Trail system.

Jason was an integral member of the Uncas Leap Steering Committee and he was passionate about turning the site into a heritage park for residents and visitors to enjoy. Jason was a firm believer in partnerships and played a key role in getting all of the Norwich Heritage Groups to collaborate with each other. Jason was a problem solver, a big thinker, and had a can-do attitude that inspired everyone.



His profound loss will be felt for years to come; he was truly a champion for Norwich. Jason was a colleague, mentor, and friend to everyone at NHS. We extend our deepest and heartfelt sympathies to Jason's family and friends. NHS is honored by the family's decision to direct donations to the organization in his memory. The Norwich Historical Society will do our best to honor his legacy and move the projects that he cared about forward.

LETTER TO MEMBERS

Dear Member,

I hope you and your loved ones continue to remain healthy and happy during these very trying times.

2020 was a difficult year for many and NHS joined many other organizations in "pivoting" our programming to a virtual platform. NHS was fortunate to receive support from Chelsea Groton Bank and partner with the Last Green Valley to create virtual tours of our popular walking tours. All of our virtual experiences are on our NHS and Walk Norwich websites.


The ongoing global pandemic did not prevent our important rehabilitation work on the c. 1772 Joseph Carpenter Silversmith Shop and the c.1763 David Greenleaf House. The ongoing restoration of these properties is a part of a larger partnership formed by the Society of the Founders of Norwich (SFN) and NHS to improve upon existing heritage tourism sites in Norwich.

This past year, the Carpenter Shop received a new cedar roof, repaired the chimney using an eighteenth century mortar recipe, repaired the rear fieldstone foundation, installed a new period-style bulkhead, a French drain and new gutters were installed to mitigate drainage issues, windows and clapboards were repaired and painted, and a new energy efficient heating system was installed. In early 2021, a new handicapped accessible bathroom was completed using material salvaged from an eighteenth century farm house slated for demotion in Montville.

Our Phase 1 preservation work on the David A. Greenleaf House is also ongoing. This past summer saw the clearing of the property of brush and an archaeological survey was performed to prepare for future site work. Further, the Fall saw the building painted and the windows repaired or replaced with custom wood windows. There will be more exciting updates to announce regarding this project in 2021.

NHS helped secure a buyer to save the c. 1659 Pease Calkins House from demolition.

VIRTUAL PROGRAM


NHS partnered with The Lafayette Trail to host a Zoom Lecture on Lafayette's 1824 visit to Norwich.




